EASY APPLE TART

Ingredients:

- 1 refrigerated ready-to-use pie crust
- 1 pound Pink Lady apples, cored and sliced
- 2 tablespoons cold butter
- 1/4 cup granulated sugar
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon

Directions:

Remove pie crust from refrigerator and warm to room temperature, about 15 to 20 minutes.

Heat oven to 425° F.

Unroll the crust and place it on a large baking sheet. Arrange sliced apples on the crust, leaving about 2 inches of space around the edge.

Chop cold butter into small pieces and scatter over the apples.

Mix sugar and cinnamon together and sprinkle on top of the butter and apples.

Fold the sides of the open pie crust over the apples—this will not cover them, but contain them inside the crust.

Bake 20 to 25 minutes until crust is golden brown and apples are just soft.

Army vs. Navy: America's Game



The annual Army-Navy football game, known as "America's Game," kicked off as a simple challenge back in the late 1800s, but remains today as one of the greatest rivalries in sports.

The first gridiron matchup between the Army Black Knights of the U.S. Military Academy at West Point, N.Y., and the Navy Midshipmen of the U.S. Naval Academy at Annapolis, Md., took place Nov. 29, 1890, after Navy issued a challenge to Army's newly formed football team. Navy won that first meeting with a score of 24-0.

Except for a few occasions, the two service academies have squared off annually since 1899, traditionally on the second Saturday in December. Because crowds for the game are so large, the game is held at a neutral host stadium, most often in Philadelphia, and televised nationally.



Talking Turkey



For more than 30 years, the experts at the Butterball Turkey Talk-Line have been at the ready, answering home cooks' holiday turkey-related questions. Here's a taste of some of the hotline's most memorable inquiries:

The Lowdown on Elections

Every four years, Americans head to the polls in November to cast ballots for the nation's president.

Late fall was historically considered a good time for elections because the harvest was mostly over and winter weather hadn't set in yet. The days varied, however, until 1845, when Congress set the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November as the day for presidential elections.

Enjoy these additional facts about elections:

- Prior to 1804, the presidential candidate who received the second-highest number of electoral votes was named the vice president.
- The only bachelor elected president was James Buchanan.
- John F. Kennedy was the youngest elected U.S. president at 43. Ronald Reagan was the oldest at 73.
- The only president and vice president not elected to either office was Gerald Ford. He became vice president after Spiro Agnew resigned and became president when Richard Nixon resigned.



Remember When: Holiday Catalogs

Long before the days of online shopping or heading to the local mall, many gift lists were completed by way of mail-order catalogs. Montgomery Ward is credited with popularizing the modern catalog business beginning in 1872. Over the decades, the retailer, along with companies such as Sears and JCPenney, enticed customers with large, semi-annual editions that included all types of merchandise. Because many referred to the catalogs as a “book of wishes”—especially children who would pore over the pages of toys—in 1933, Sears began titling its holiday catalog as the Wish Book.

Memorable Melody: ‘Tie a Yellow Ribbon Round the Ole Oak Tree’

The signature song of the pop trio Tony Orlando and Dawn was named the No. 1 song of 1973 by Billboard after topping the charts for a month in the U.S. and the U.K., then Australia and New Zealand. Its lyrics tell the story of a man who asks his love to tie a yellow ribbon around the oak tree in front of their home as a signal he is welcome back. The song became a call to action, and the yellow ribbon is now a national symbol used to show a family is awaiting the return of a missing loved one, particularly those serving in the military.
