A Landmark for Lincoln

The Lincoln Memorial on the National Mall in Washington, D.C., honors the 16th president of the United States, Abraham Lincoln. Born Feb. 12, 1809, Lincoln served from 1861 to 1865.



- The memorial project got underway in 1910. Daniel Chester French designed the statue, which was produced by a family of Italian marble carvers known as the Piccirilli Brothers. Architect Henry Bacon created the monument building using a classic Greek design.
- The building contains inscriptions of Lincoln's Gettysburg Address and his second inaugural address.
- Carved from 28 blocks of white Georgia marble, the statue of Abe is 19 feet tall.
- The memorial building also consists of Colorado Yule marble, Tennessee pink marble, Massachusetts granite and Indiana limestone.
- The Lincoln Memorial cost \$3 million to build.
- The structure was dedicated on May 30, 1922. About 50,000 people attended the ceremonies, including hundreds of Civil War veterans and 78-year-old Robert Todd Lincoln, the president's son.
- The Lincoln Memorial is open to the public 24 hours a day. About 6 million people visit the site each year.
- The memorial has appeared in numerous movies, including "National Treasure" and "In the Line of Fire."

Sweets to the Sweet

The tradition of gifting chocolate candy in heart-shaped boxes can be traced back to Victorian times. Richard Cadbury, of England's famous family of chocolate makers, began packaging their sweets in decorated boxes shaped like a heart, which Cadbury himself designed. The artful containers were often saved to hold keepsakes. Today, 36 million heart-shaped boxes of candy are sold each year for Valentine's Day.

Popcorn Pick: 'Groundhog Day'

An unexplained phenomenon makes every day Feb. 2 to Phil Connors, played by Bill Murray in this 1993 comedy classic. The grouchy and self-centered TV weatherman is sent on assignment to cover the annual Groundhog Day festivities in Punxsutawney, Pa., but after a snowstorm strands him and his crew there, he wakes up to relive every moment of the same day over and over, no matter what he does. Only when he learns to better himself and help others is Connors able to use this wrinkle in time to his advantage.

METEOROLOGISTS MAKE THE CALL



Celebrate your favorite meteorologist on Weatherperson's Day, Feb. 5, which was the birthday of John Jeffries, one of America's first weather watchers. Jeffries began daily weather observations in Boston in 1774.

Meteorology is the study of the atmosphere and takes its name from the Greek word "meteoron," which refers to something that happens in the sky.

The American Meteorological Society defines a meteorologist as a person "who uses scientific principles to explain, understand, observe or forecast the Earth's atmospheric phenomena." These phenomena include temperature, air pressure and wind direction.

Many meteorologists have degrees in physics, chemistry or mathematics. Their jobs include daily weather forecasting, research, teaching and broadcasting. Meteorologists in private sector companies serve clients such as energy providers, agricultural businesses and airlines.

The U.S. government is the largest employer of meteorologists, many of whom work at the National Weather Service.

One high-profile meteorologist is the Weather Channel's Jim Cantore, who has developed forecasts for the National Football League, the Professional Golfers' Association and space shuttle launches.

BAKED BRIE

Ingredients:

- 2 tablespoons unsalted butter
- 8 ounces button mushrooms, sliced
- Kosher salt
- Ground black pepper
- 1 Brie round (8 ounces)
- 3 tablespoons honey
- 1/4 cup pomegranate arils
- 1/4 cup shelled pistachios
- Crackers or toasted bread

Directions:

Heat oven to 350° F.

In large skillet, heat butter over medium-high heat. Add mushrooms; cook 8 to 10 minutes or until deep golden brown, stirring frequently. Season with salt and pepper; remove from heat.

Place Brie on parchment paper-lined rimmed baking pan; drizzle with honey.

Transfer to oven and bake 5 to 7 minutes or until inside of cheese is softened, but outside remains intact.

Transfer Brie to serving platter; top with pomegranate arils, pistachios and mushrooms.

Serve immediately with crackers or bread.

Counting Birds for a Cause

Every February, nature lovers across the globe have the chance to help out scientists by participating in the Great Backyard Bird Count.

Created in 1998 by the Cornell Lab of Ornithology and the National Audubon Society, the project collects real-time data on wild bird species over four days. You don't have to be a bird-watching expert to take part—in fact, Audubon scientists recommend the project as a fun and worthwhile introduction to birding.

After creating a free online account at GBBC.BirdCount.org, simply tally the numbers and kinds of birds you see for at least 15 minutes on one or more days of the count and submit the results. Experts suggest familiarizing yourself with the key bird identification categories—size and shape, color pattern, behavior, and habitat—and consulting a field guide specific to birds in your region.

In addition to tallying species, the bird count also helps researchers study climate change, avian diseases and other factors that can affect bird populations and migration patterns.

This year's Great Backyard Bird Count takes place Feb. 17–20.
